Guided Walk: a morning walk around Arundel led by John Barkshire plus opportunity to visit Arundel Museum in the afternoon

Date: Thursday 26 September 2019

Time: 10:30 – 12:30 plus afternoon visit to the Museum

Location: Meet at Arundel Museum, Mill Road, Arundel, West Sussex BN18 9PA. There is a large car park next to the Museum. You will need to pay for parking.

Cost: Members £7.00, non-members £12.00. Payment is due by 23rd August 2019. Details of how to pay will be sent when your place is confirmed.

Outline: We will start by having tea/coffee and biscuits at the Museum and meet our guide. Then we will have a walk around Arundel with a commentary on buildings of interest and visiting St Nicholas' Church and Arundel Cathedral. The walk will last about one and a half hours. There is a good choice of cafes and restaurants if you wish to buy lunch afterwards. Anyone who would like to visit – or revisit – the Museum will have the opportunity to do so in the afternoon. The Museum closes at 4pm.

Study Day – Coins Part 2: The Coins, Tokens and Jetons of England, c. AD 600-1971 led by David Rudling (Sussex School of Archaeology)

Date: Sunday 13 October 2019

Time: 10:30 – 16:30

Location: Fishbourne Roman Palace (Rudkin Room), Roman Way, Fishbourne, Chichester PO19 3QR. There is plenty of parking.

Cost: Members £25, non-members £30 (if places are available). Payment is due by 15th September 2019. Details of how to pay will be sent when your place is confirmed.

Outline: Led by David Rudling, this follow on/Part 2 day school will continue examination of the development of coinage in Britain from Saxon to post-medieval times. Participants will also examine the issuing of private tokens made of pewter, lead, copper and silver, and briefly review the use of casting counters or Jetons. By the end of the session participants should be familiar with the main sequences of coin, token and jetton types for the post-Roman periods in England.

Note: It is not necessary to have attended Part 1 on 7 April to benefit from this study day.

Thorney Island member-led visit

Location: Starts at Eames Farm, Thorney Road, Emsworth, PO10 8DE.

Cost: Members £10, non-members £15.00. Payment is due by 20 September

Outline: CDAS is delighted to offer another opportunity to visit Thorney Island highlighting the work CDAS has done there including work relating to World War II monuments, the Roman Pottery Collection, LiDAR, field systems and prehistoric finds.

We will start the day at Eames Farm with the presentations. After a refreshment break, we will drive to Thorney Island for the guided walk. The walk itself will take about 3 hours and will include many of the sites mentioned in the presentations. After the walk we will return to Eames Farm. Please bring a packed lunch. We will have lunch at Eames Farm either before or after the walk, depending on the final timings.

Important information about this event. Please read this before booking.

Thorney Island is a military site. We have permission for the walk but it could be withdrawn even at the last minute.

All cars driven onto Thorney Island will need to be booked in advance. As we must minimise the number of cars we take onto the island we need volunteers to offer lifts to other members and provide their car details.

As well as wearing appropriate footwear, you need to be reasonably fit to do this walk as you will be on your feet for about 3 hours.

The walk will go ahead whatever the weather so please come prepared.

Don't forget to bring a packed lunch.

Proposed vegetation clearance around WW2 features on Thorney Island

Following the success of last year's event Anne de Potier plans to arrange another visit to do light vegetation clearance around various features including a pillbox and a gun emplacement. It's mostly brambles and ivy, and not strenuous. If you have not been part of the Condition Assessment team it's a good opportunity to see the sites.

We propose to do this on Tuesday 8 October, meeting at 09:30 at the junction of Thorney Road and Thornham Lane (SU757049). As with all meetings on Thorney, if you want to bring a car onto the base you need to tell us in advance, so please email the make, model, colour and registration number of your car to annedp@waitrose.com by Friday 5 October. Bring photo ID on the day. You cannot decide to bring a car at the last minute, but you can come as a passenger. If you send in details and then decide not to come that's no problem for the system. If you would like to come but cannot do that date please contact Anne, as there may be other opportunities.

Please wear stout boots and bring thick gloves and tools such as secateurs, loppers, a spade and/or a digging fork if you can. You may also like to bring a flask and a snack, and insect repellent! We will drive between sites but there will be a little walking as well. A risk assessment

will be sent to participants. This is an official CDAS event so you will be asked to complete the usual paperwork.

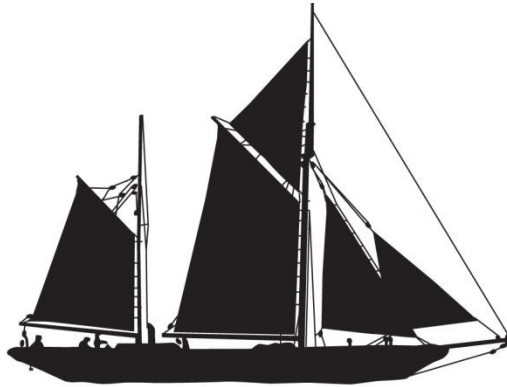
