



## **CDAS – Chairman's Monthly Letter – December 2020**

I spoke to soon in November's Newsletter that things are starting to get back to a more normal situation. Following the easing of the Lockdown at the beginning of December it looks like we will be on Tier 2 and back to the famous rule of 6 regarding Fieldwork.

### **Fieldwork**

#### **Langford Farm**

We have published the report on the survey of the Villa site and Roman road. We hope to be able to excavate the villa site at some point in the future.

#### **Hoyle Farm**

We completed the survey of the area on either side of the stream near the house. The area around the stream looked promising as the site of a kiln based on the Saxon pottery found in the stream. Unfortunately, the survey did not find anything of note.

We had a fresh look at the area 300 metres south of the stream where the seam of red clay is located. During the summer there was a gentle trickle of water flowing in drainage ditch at the edge of the woodland. When we looked at it in November it was more of a raging torrent. This has made us think that pottery production might have been seasonal.

We intend to survey this southern area in the spring, probably in March.

#### **Medmerry**

Peter King has been keeping an eye on developments at Medmerry in particular the Coastguard Station. Some more of it has been exposed but other parts have been swept away. We will plan to make a visit to the site probably in February.

### **Talks**

## **Virtual Coffee Morning**

We held an informal virtual coffee morning using Microsoft Teams on 24<sup>th</sup> November. I gave a short presentation on the work we have been doing on Roman Roads. It also gave us a dry run of MS Teams in preparation for the AGM.

We had more than 30 people logged on to the meeting. A few people had trouble getting the link to work but the feedback from the majority was generally positive. A number of people contacted me after the meeting with comments and questions.

Reflecting on the generally positive response we have been considering making this a regular feature of CDAS's on-line presence. Currently we circulate fieldwork reports to participants but not the wider membership. Many of our reports are not published due to confidentiality requirements. Many members only see snippets about our fieldwork as they are reported in the Monthly Newsletter.

A short presentation in a virtual coffee morning would allow us to share our work with all the members without placing too much of a burden on those leading the fieldwork.

## **AGM**

We will hold our AGM as a virtual meeting at 7pm on 2<sup>nd</sup> December using Microsoft Teams.

I will send out instructions for joining the meeting in the next day or so.

## **Other news**

James Brown, our contact at the National Trust is working on a new project the Changing Chalk landscape partnership scheme. This a potentially exciting archaeology project on the horizon through a proposed National Lottery Heritage Funded scheme: Changing Chalk.

Changing Chalk is a partnership that will work with local communities and landowners to connect people with nature and heritage as well as address some of the challenges facing the Sussex Downs to protect this fragile chalk grassland landscape for future generations. The focus is on the chalk grassland landscape of the Sussex Downs and the communities of the coastal urban fringe of Brighton and Hove, Eastbourne and Lewes.

The scheme is currently in a funded development phase which will result in a final application to NLHF in May 2021. If successful the whole scheme will commence in January 2022 and run for over four years.

Though the project is some way off and outside our area we have been invited to participate. It will be using a similar approach to the Secrets of the Highwoods project to map out archaeological features including identifying previously unknown ones.

### **Sussex Heritage Watch**

Daryl Holter who you may remember gave us a talk on his work as Sussex Police Heritage Crime Advisor has set-up a new project Sussex Heritage Watch. This project is completely separate from his work for Sussex Police but builds on the skills he has developed in that role.
