#### ***The Archaeology of Death and Commemoration***

*The study of human remains can be one of the most exciting and rewarding elements of archaeology, providing direct evidence of the condition (and indeed conditions) of our ancestors. Skeletal remains can harbour a variety of information ranging from gender and stature, to lifestyle and disease. In the exact opposite method to a modern doctor, the archaeologist may be able to see what was wrong with an individual and then work out the symptoms.*

*Perhaps a less recognised element of the study of death is the archaeological analysis of monuments associated with commemoration and remembrance. From Neolithic tombs to Commonwealth war grave cemeteries, attitudes to the deceased can be literally set in stone. A wander around a country churchyard can reveal a surprising array of memorials and approaches to celebrating the Date - Saturday 3rd September 2022*

## **Fieldwork**

The following is a summary of other activities currently being carried out under the governance of the Fieldwork Committee (thanks to Mike for the summary, it makes my life easier pulling this Newsletter together) ;

### **Summary from the minutes of the FW Committee Meeting 24/6/22**



The **Priory Park Excavation** - went well with the results justifying the effort. 57 members were involved

**Old Idsworth, Main/Church Field** – it is hoped to get agreement for a limited excavation this year. The crop cycle means site probably available between July/Aug - October.

**Oyster Quay, Pook Lane**:- investigation completed and report drafted. No further work is anticipated.

**Petworth North Lawn** – this small investigation was undertaken as part of an NT open day. The trench and CDAS's activities generated lots of interest.

**Coastal Monitoring** – a return to **Medmerry** not possible until the autumn.

**Geophys surveys** – a number of possible opportunities for later in the autumn are under investigation.

Following the agreement to change the constitution CDAS can resubmit its application for a grant towards the cost of a new magnetometer.

### Notes on Small Projects

*The Fieldwork Committee is keen to build-up a bigger skill base amongst CDAS members. They are proposing to run some small-scale projects with an emphasis on training; these will go through all the usual project stages. Given that such projects will make use of skilled members and equipment they will still need to be approved & scheduled by the FWC in the same way as other projects. These small projects will be just one or two days long and usually aimed at a single archaeological feature. The organisation requirements are intended to be lighter than the larger one to two weeks projects.*

### CDAS In the Community

As I mentioned in my intro, Shelagh Standen and I recently visited a local Primary School to talk about what Archaeologists do and Romans in Chichester linked to our work at Priory Park. We worked up a pack targeted at Key Stage 2 pupils and we delivered our talk on Monday 27 June. The children seemed interested and had plenty of questions; some related to Romans, some to Archaeology and some quite random;

“How old are you?”

“Have you ever dug up a bike?”

“Are you famous?”

After I delivered the talk, Shelagh and I split with the 2 classes, I handled the Q&A whilst Shelagh showed our finds/ handling trays to the other class.

It was great fun and with a targeted pack, this could be the type of activity we could do more of. If anyone is interested in getting involved in similar activity please let me know. We're not actively publicising this as a CDAS offering but you never know, word might get around the teaching networks. Obviously experience of dealing with children aged 7-8 would be a great help !



One of the teachers we met in the staffroom said his parents-in-law run the café in Priory Park,. I mentioned our patronage of the said establishment during our tenure in the park and hinted we ought to get a discount. He said he doesn't even get a discount ! Oh well , worth a try.

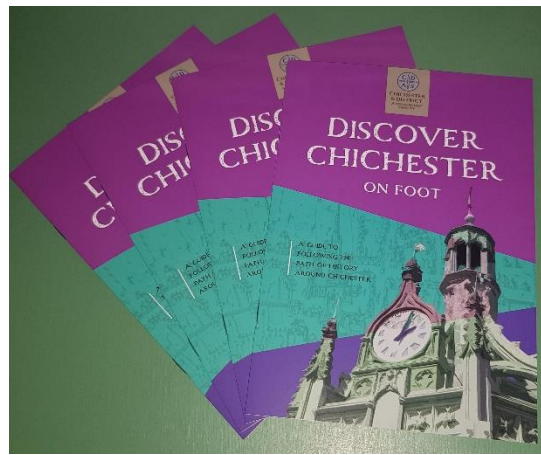
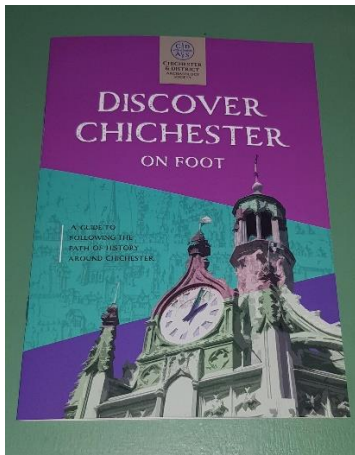
## Magnetometer / SGM

To support our proposed work on the Hill Top Project we need to replace our old Mag kit. The Fieldwork committee have agreed that Bartington best meets our requirements and financial support would be sought on the strength of the Hill Top project.

As you will have seen in other correspondence **Trevor Davies** had submitted an application via the **Heritage Lottery Fund**. This resulted in the identification of a need to amend our Constitution. We gave notice of a Special General Meeting to discuss and approve this change and I'm happy to say this was enacted and approved at that meeting. Thank you everyone who attended and unanimously voted this change through and for those who could make the meeting but offered to if necessary, even an offer to phone in from an airport departure lounge. Thankfully we had sufficient numbers without having to call in these kind offers.

## Discover Chichester on Foot – A new guided walk book

Our new, revamped, glossy Walking guide to Chichester is now in stock and will be available at New Park Talks. They will also be sold at the Novium and available for us to sell direct at events. The books are priced at £3.00 (£2.50 to members) so the more we sell direct the better the return for us to fund CDAS activities.

### Skills Matrix / Skills Passport

Further to discussion in the General Committee the Field Work Committee are following up on this led by Brian Tomkinson. The idea is that CDAS might eventually have its own version of the Archaeology Skills Passport utilized in the industry on a professional basis. This would serve 2 purposes;

- i) it would be a way for members to track their skills level across a wide range of activities offered by the society, and identify activities that perhaps they were not aware of that they might want to learn or participate in on future digs /fieldwork
- ii) it would be a record of member's skills for the society to identify people with appropriate skills when scheduling the roles required in field activity. It might also surface skills that members have that we are unaware of that we could utilize within the society (of course only if members wish to offer such services)

As a start point and strictly **\*on a voluntary basis**, we hope to have Skills Forms for people to complete at Priory Park, either in paper form or via a Word document /email. Brian Tomkinson, our current Membership secretary has volunteered to pull this information together, with my assistance.

The skills matrix itself will be a simple list of all the activities we undertake and you will be asked whether you consider yourself ; Novice, Intermediate or Expert in each area.

*\*to be clear this is a voluntary scheme that is intended to help both members and the society – it is not a report card ! Nor does it replace the BAJR Skills Passport, if members are pursuing an academic or professional path in Archaeology you would still need to maintain and complete the industry passport.*

### Fieldwork Project Managers



I am keen to maintain momentum on this item that Trevor raised last year. We have a concern that the effort of organizing Fieldwork projects falls on the shoulders of relatively few people.
